




Marj Robertson wrote an article in a prominent canine magazine called *Dog Fancy*; January 1981. It's a lovely article about this interesting breed.

Ponderings by your Pastor

It is called connectionalism. As Presbyterians, we are connected to other churches, not simply by the informal bonds of fellowship, but by formal bonds of support and accountability. In the Northwest there are 17 churches with which we hold these close bonds of fellowship and mutual support. When one church suffers, we all suffer with them. When one church rejoices, we all rejoice together. If you have spent any time in the church, you know that problems arise. Occasionally problems arise that are too big for an individual church to handle with her own resources, so the other churches we are associated with help bear the burden.

There is a real cost involved in this. By God's grace, over the decades of our existence, Faith OPC has been more about giving help than needing help. Over your history, your pastors and elders have been useful resources to help other churches in need. Just in my limited knowledge of our history, I know that Pastor Conard and Pastor Sumpter worked diligently to help many churches of the presbytery. For years Elder Jensen would sacrifice time at home to go and visit churches in need and provide wise counsel to them. Your other elders have served in many functions that have helped other churches. I am proud to be part of this long line of elders from Faith OPC who sacrificially give to help our sister churches in their time of trouble.

This is not just the way it is with inter church relationships. It is also the way it needs to be in our Christian Fellowship. See how 1 Thessalonians 5:14-15 teaches us to help one another! "14 Now we exhort you, brethren, warn those who are unruly, comfort the fainthearted, uphold the weak, be patient with all. 15 See that no one renders evil for evil to anyone, but always pursue what is good both for yourselves and for all." Our very own Missionary—Rachel VanderWall, in her own words

I hope to begin 2022 a little differently than I've welcomed in previous years – likely in an Indian airport, slightly jet-lagged, wrinkly, and hungry, as I travel to a hospital North Eastern India to spend a month there.

Why am I going? I'm glad you asked...



The back story, which I'll give you briefly, is that this is a step that I hope to be helpful in preparation for long-term medical mission-work in the future. For those of you who don't know, I'm originally from Michigan and moved to Oregon in August of 2020. The Lord put missions into my heart in my late teens and as I have grown in relationship to Him over the years, that burden has grown increasingly stronger. I finished my Nurse Practitioner degree in the end of 2019 and the Lord led me to Grants Pass, where I hope to spend some time before going overseas longer-term as a missionary. In the time the Lord has me here prior devoting my time to long-term missions, I hope to continue to grow in missiological, spiritual, and medical

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maturity for the work that lies ahead – and one of the ways that I hope to do that is short-term medical mission trips.

The Lord opened up an opportunity for me to visit a mission hospital in India in January of 2022 and offer my time and medical training to them for a month. The hospital is called the Christian Institute of Health Sciences and Research, located in Northeast India. The needs that I plan to devote my time to are in development and teaching in areas that I have some experience in and that the hospital has indicated as areas that would benefit.

My primary areas of focus will be:

- 1. Burn care: Teaching nurses and students on burn and wound management and helping to develop their burn unit.
- 2. Cardiac (Heart care): Nursing training in cath lab and cardiac care protocols
- 3. Assisting in their development of a Pulmonary Rehabilitation program
- 4. Assisting with a Nurse Educator Program Curriculum with a focus on whole person care.

There will also be some opportunities for me to do some learning while I am there, by spending time with the specialists that are at that hospital – this will be very valuable for me as I learn medical care specific to that part of the world. Some of these specialties are Internal Medicine, Outpatient medicine, Cardiology, Dermatology, Palliative care and Community Medicine. Other specialties in which I hope to spend some time are the quality management, communications, and spiritual training team. Some of these opportunities may open doors for me to do more long-term work with this hospital or to carry over some of what I learn to other places.

For the months leading up to the trip, I have a lot of preparation to do. I am currently working on gathering educational materials for teaching nurses who work in cardiology and have been putting together burn training. I plan to start focusing more on the pulmonary rehabilitation material in November and Nursing Education in December. Meanwhile, I am currently working on the visa application and specifics of my travel plan.

The hospital has offered to provide room and board free of charge during my stay there in exchange for the work that I'll be doing for them, which is a great blessing. The Lord has also provided many contacts in the specialty areas that I'll be teaching in and these contacts have been invaluable resources to me as I prepare.

Please partner with me in praying for the preparation and for the time that the Lord has for me in India. Specific requests include: Getting approval for the visa, continuing to put my focus on God's agenda for my time and not my own agenda, maintaining a missional and spiritual focus in the midst of a large load of medical objectives, and safety during travel. *Rachel VanderWall*

I grew up in a Baptist church. The price of salvation was "praying the prayer". Once you do that, you're good, I understood. Of course it would bring with it things like obedience to God and submission to His will. That was the downside. So in my preteen mind I decided I would wait until just before I died, then I would say the prayer. That way I could live my life the way I wanted, without any interference from things like "the will of God", and still avoid Hell after death. It seemed like a good plan.

I was slow to grasp the concept that I didn't actually know when I was going to die. Once it was pointed out to me that I could die from something other than old age, I decided I had better get my "fire insurance" and I prayed the prayer. The prayer would work. The prayer was what would save me. I had great faith in my prayer.

God, however, does not call us to faith in prayer. He calls us to have faith in Himself. Once I discovered the Reformed faith, things made sense. My prayer wasn't what saved me. Jesus saved me, and He did it by Himself, without my help.

Ed and I have attended Reformed churches since we were dating, way back before my hair turned white. (I found my first gray hair the day before our wedding...) Our first church was a tiny, beloved independent Reformed church that went up in smoke when the pastor fell into sin. Our second church was a URC church in Oceanside, which we attended when our oldest child was a baby. We moved from there to another lovely independent Reformed church a couple years later and were there for nearly twenty years, until our move to Oregon.

Through life's difficulties, God has been faithful to us. Looking back, it seems impossible that I was able to homeschool four children, some with disabilities, and work as an analyst at the same time, but by God's grace and with His strength, it happened. Looking forward, I have the same uncertainty I had at the start of my adult life, as we start over in a new location. But I believe that God led us to Grants Pass and to Faith OPC. I'm excited for the work He will do in us and through us here. Lisa

Doris & Jake Vander Stoel

I had a wonderful phone interview with Doris Vander Stoel recently. Doris and Jake have been shut-in for quite some time now as they struggle with health issues. Here are a few excerpts from our conversation:

How long have you been at Faith OPC? We were originals when it started in 1976.

How did you come to be a part of it? We came from San Diego County, CA, from the Christian Reformed Church. When we came to southern Oregon, there was no church at all. We came with our children, and Debbie wasn't even in school yet, but the other three were, three girls and a boy.

We knew some people here. When we first got started, we met in Medford, and when we got a minister, it was Calvin Malcor, and he was the minister at both, Medford and Grants Pass. He would preach a sermon in Medford, get in his car and drive like mad up the freeway to Grants Pass and preach there.

How long have you been married? You won't believe it...63 years! We were 18!

What's the secret of being married so long? To love the Lord and put Him first in your life. It's very simple, but it works. Now we have 13 grandchildren and 21 great grandchildren and two on the way!!! They just keep popping up! It's one of the great wonders of my life and the biggest pleasure, I think.

How did you and Jake meet? We were kids! Just 14 years old. We met in 4H, my projects were sewing and sheep and beef cattle and I went to the San Diego county fair. Jake had dairy cattle and went to the same county fair. It was a long distance, telephone call kind of thing. We both tried to go to college. Jake went to Dordt College when it was just two years old and I went to the University of California at Davis, an agricultural school and home economics, that was my major. But we didn't last long, because we both decided to come home. We got married in April. We were very, very young and had our first baby at 19!

Were your parents believers? My mother was of course. I have her to thank for bringing me up the right way. My father was the son of Italian immigrants who came before the turn of the century. There were 11 children. He was raised Catholic and all the years when I was young, he did not go to church with us except on Easter and Christmas. After I was married, my father retired and started going to church every Sunday with my mom. We were thankful for that. He was such a hard worker, had to be working, working, working all the time. He was a welder after he got home from WWI at a farm implement place. He always had a huge garden and cows and pigs. We had a "little farme". That's how I grew up, I was a "little farmer".

Jake was raised, of course, on a dairy farm. He and his father and his grandfather. They were immigrants and came before the war in 1934. Two of his sisters were born in Holland, then they came

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here, they had four more children. He had one brother....all the traditional things that were from Holland, we brought a lot of them into our family.

Was Jake's family Christian reformed? Long, long background of it! His whole family and now another generation...they're Christian people.

Barb & Tom Keosababian: For treatment of Tom's AFib, he has been given the option of the cardiac ablation and advised that it may fail and require a pacemaker and antiarrythmia drugs, which may also fail. The cardiac specialist warned Tom that, due to his AFib being persistent and long-standing, these treatments (at best) only have up to a 50% possibility of success. Tom is now on a waiting list (with 60 other people) and it will probably be 2 to 3 months before the ablation can be done. Meanwhile, we covet your prayers and

trust our Great Physician for His timing and outcome.

Keith and Carol Heck were most thankful for the prayers of our church family. They had a safe, uneventful roundtrip to Portland. Left at 6:30am, got home at 7:45pm.
