TEACHING MOMENT BY PASTOR KARL

J.I. Packer's book, Knowing God, has a chapter on the Goodness and Severity of our God.

Romans 11:22

"Therefore consider the goodness and severity of God: on those who fell, severity; but toward you, goodness, if you continue in His goodness. Otherwise you also will be cut off."

Here we learn that God is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, but He will not let the guilty go unpunished (EXO 34:6-7). All authority lives in the balance of this dichotomy. Later in Romans 13 we learn even that earthly government is to punish the evildoer and praise the one who does right.

The world today teaches us to only speak positively to our children. Don't tell them they are wrong, just encourage them to what is right. This worldly foolishness ignores the wise teaching of Proverbs 23:13 which tells us our children won't die if we discipline them. It will actually be good for them! This worldly foolishness in a one sided exercise of authority, which will never be a blessing.

In my experience children always need correction, and they always need encouragement. Parents need great wisdom to give their children the best prescription for their children. Remember that even Ephesians 6:4 teaches that we must raise our children in the "Nurture and Admonition of the Lord." Here is one more place where we are called to encourage our children in the right direction and discipline them for going in the wrong direction. Both are necessary.

RECIPE:

Raw Apple Cake

2 eggs, beaten

2 c. sugar

1 tsp. vanilla

½ cup oil

2 cups sifted flour

1 tsp. soda

2 tsp. cinnamon

¾ tsp. salt

1 cup chopped nuts

4 cups chopped apples

Beat together eggs, sugar, and vanilla.

Beat in oil until smooth

Sift together flour, soda, cinnamon, and salt.

Stir in dry ingredients into egg mixture.

Add nuts and apple and mix well.

Turn into a greased and floured 11" x 7" pan.

Bake at 325 ° for 1 hour.

Cool cake in pan.

Serve with ice cream or whipped cream.

In that blur a burden became a joy.

FROM THE HEART BY LAYLE

I had no close girlfriends when I was a kid. One reason was I was not willing to share myself, my trials or tribulations with anyone. I am still having trouble sharing with you all-but mostly with God. I know He already knows all, but I am learning He wants me to get to know Him and feel free to talk to Him. Since coming to this church, I have realized several ways to get to know Him:

- 1. Attending church every week I can
- 2. Attend any and all opportunities to worship, pray, and hear His Word. (such as meals, evening services Bible studies)
 - 3. To read the Word every day
- 4. Pray, pray for pastor, elders, persons sitting next to me in church and the prayer list, the government, missionaries (I don't always know what the need is but this actual act of praying for them helps).

Sometimes it feels like others will think me off for stepping out in another meeting. I feel I do not have anything to add to another meeting-just taking up time and space. BUT I am finding that the more I step out, the more a part of those meetings I feel. I really <u>do</u> have something to add. Those around me sometimes want to hear what I have to say. (I recently read a saying that if I do not step out— that space will not be filled. I am the <u>only</u> one who sees the things I have seen. No one else has been where I was and am.) When asked if I would like to join the Tuesday morning Bible class taught by Marj Robertson (with the leading of the Holy Spirit) I immediately felt, I have nothing to add. I do not read well. I do not retain information. But I went anyway and I find myself really learning. I <u>do</u> know most of the books of the Bible (at least I usually know if the book is in the OT or the NT.) I sometimes stumble when reading, but so do others.

I do not jump others for their mistakes, and they do not jump me when I misread. We all need each other; we need to read aloud, pray aloud and feel no condemnation. We need to hear God speaking to us. We need to hear our sisters voice the same reservations as we have.

Marj has such wisdom in her teaching—it would be bad for us to one day realize we could have/should have been sitting in her class but stubborn foolish pride held us back, and we missed her loving care.

Another thing I have learned is God uses the weak to confound the mighty. That is very true with me. If He ever uses me, it will be very true. I am trying to learn to say, "Here I am Lord, send me". Layle Parades

Goodreads review by Frode Jensen

This book is not yet in the library, but several people in church have it if you want to borrow it.

R.C. Sproul, A Life is a biography of R.C. written by Stephen J. Nichols. Since I liked and admired R.C., this book was a natural for me. We were pretty much of the same age, so we grew up in the same time frame. His experiences were not mine, but they had some commonality. Mr. Nichols is a good

and clear writer, so I thought the book flowed quite well.

The book itself is a combination of three things. Much of the material was taken from interviews Nichols had with R.C. There is some commentary by the author and by others who were associated with R.C., and finally there are many sections taken from R.C.'s books, so R.C. in a sense wrote a good portion of the book. Thus, the book is a mixture of R.C.'s history and his theology along with some personal reflections.

The book is chronological; it begins with R.C.'s birth and ends with his death. Of course, no book can encapsulate a man's entire life, so it hits the high points and emphasizes certain things. The big takeaway is that R.C. was captivated by God's holiness; it was what drove his ministry. His passion was that the average Christian would come to a greater understanding of who God is. Getting that concept would illuminate and inform a person about who he is. I think it is all about properly understanding the creature/Creator concept.

R.C. was a great communicator. His mentors were what he called, "battleground theologians." He loved Luther, but he also highly appreciated Aristotle, Aquinas, Augustine, Calvin, Turretin, Edwards, Hodge, Warfield, and his personal teacher, John Gerstner. R.C. learned much from these men and in turn was able to teach much of what he had learned to the man in the pew. While R.C. was an academic, he was equally at home with regular folks; in fact, they were really the ones he aimed at. From its beginnings in Pennsylvania to its current location in Florida, there is much about the work and its development and all its various

ministries and how they came to be. R.C. was a man full of ideas and energy and vision. God used him mightily: Ligonier, R.C.'s 100+ books, teaching videos, *Tabletalk*, the "Renewing Your Mind" radio programs and podcasts, conferences, New Saint Andrew's Church, and Reformation Bible College are examples. This biography gives an overview of all that and more. I recommend it. FJ
