Hebrews 2:8b-9a

THE WALLS OF JERICHO CAME TUMBLING DOWN

This is from an article in the Faith Family Forum I 1983

If you read the account of the fall of Jericho in Joshua 6:1-20 and use your calculator with a little imagination, you will know what action Joshua and his people took against the city.

Suppose Joshua had a total of 151,213 people in his army, including himself. Now all these people marched around the city once each day for six days, and seven times on the seventh day. Calculate how many trampling feet went around the city on all those trips to find that mysterious word which describes what they were doing to the city.

PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Paul, in ICorinthians 14:40, teaches that the church needs to work decently and in order. We seek to take this call seriously in every aspect of our ministry. This even applies to the administrative considerations when someone joins the church.

There are three ways to be received as a member of Faith OPC. The first way is to be received by profession of faith. Someone who has recently come to saving faith in Christ Jesus can become a member this way. Sometimes it is a person who was baptized as an infant, who has been a non-communicant member, who has now come to saving faith. They would be received by profession of faith. Otherwise, if the person had not been baptized as an infant, they would need to be baptized as part of their being received (since baptism is the sign and seal of God's covenant people.)

Secondly, a person may be received by letter of transfer from an other church of like faith and practice. Generally, people coming from reformed and presbyterian churches are received this way. Although we enjoy the bonds of unity with all Christian churches, this reception is a reflection of the closest kinship that we enjoy. Finally those who are members of other churches, or who were baptized and made a profession of faith at another church, but for one reason or other are not currently members of a church, are received by reaffirmation of faith. It is not their first profession of faith, but it is their affirmation of faith before this church.

The end result is the same. Each person is a full member of the church with all the rights, privileges and responsibilities of membership.

HIKING TRAILS TO EXPLORE

CATHEDRAL HILLS TRAIL—This 10-mile trail system is a haven for hikers, mountain bikers, horseback riders, and trail runners. Located minutes from downtown Grants Pass, the trails loop through 400 acres of Douglas-fir and ponderosa pine forests and provide views of the Rogue Valley and surrounding mountains.

- Cathedral Hills contains two trees on the <u>Oregon Champion Tree Registry</u>: a 25-foot-tall whiteleaf manzanita and a 117-foot-tall knobcone pine.

DOLLAR MOUNTAIN TRAIL HEAD—1691-1635 NW Crescent Dr, Grants Pass, Explore this 1.9-mile out-and-back trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route

EAST APPLEGATE RIDGE TRAIL—Enjoy this 5.2-mile point-to-point trail near Jacksonville, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 23 min to complete. This is a popular trail for birding, hiking, and horseback riding, but you can still enjoy some solitude during quieter times of day. Located off Sterling Creek Road in Jacksonville, OR. <u>Directions here.</u>

BOLT MOUNTAIN TRAIL—Enjoy this 6.8-mile out-and-back trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 3 h 18 min to complete. 1418-1434, Stringer Gap Rd, Grants Pass, OR 97527. The trail ends near Fish Hatchery Park.

TIN PAN PEAK TRAILS—6.8-mile out-and-back trail near Gold Hill, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 3 h 21 min to complete. <u>Location is here.</u>

ELK LANE REC LOOP—4.9-mile loop trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 19 min to complete. Located at the end of Elk Lane.

BABY FOOT LAKE TRAIL—Head out on this 2.5-mile out-and-back trail near Kerby, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 1 h 18 min to complete. <u>Located in Kerby, OR</u>.

LIMPY BOTANICAL INTERPERTATIVE TRAIL—Enjoy this 0.9-mile loop trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 23 min to complete. <u>Link is here.</u>

WATERS CREEK INTERPERTATIVE TRAIL—3.2-mile loop trail near Wilderville, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 1 h 18 min to complete. <u>Location is here.</u>

BRIGGS CREEK TRAIL—Head out on this 8.1-mile out-and-back trail near Selma, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 3 h 14 min to complete. Directions.

TAYOR CREEK TRAIL—Get to know this 5.1-mile out-and-back trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 2 h 29 min to complete. <u>Directions.</u>

LONDON PIKE ACCESS TRAIL—3.9-mile out-and-back trail near Wolf Creek, Oregon. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 50 min to complete. <u>Directions</u>

FELTON MEMORIAL TRAIL (enchanted forest)—4.6-mile out-and-back trail near Jacksonville, Oregon. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 6 min to complete. Directions

REINHART VOLUNTEER PARK LOOP—3.0-mile loop trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 55 min to complete. <u>Directions</u>

ONION MTN. LOOKOUT POINT—1.6-mile out-and-back trail near Grants Pass, Oregon. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 53 min to complete. Directions.

WHEN HELPING HURTS

We are surrounded by people in need, and it is often difficult to know how to respond to those needs. Very often, the thing that the person believes they need is not really the thing that would be most helpful. Love and wisdom are necessary to determine how best to help someone.

The book *When Helping Hurts* instructs us that there is a way to help someone that in reality hurts them, and may also do damage to ourselves as well. When people are in crisis, helping them with immediate needs is crucial because they are often helpless. But, as people progress past the crisis, they need to receive help owning their own remedies and providing their own help. The problem arises when we act as though people are helpless, when they really have the capacity to help themselves. This does great harm by communicating to the people that they actually are helpless, so they stay in full dependence. In reality, the best course of action is to assist them in providing for themselves, when they are at this stage.

Wisdom and love are necessary. It takes wisdom to determine how to help the person. Making the right diagnosis and determine the best course of action are not easy decision to come to, as many variables need to be weighed. It also requires love, because it is hard to help people. It is often easier to give them what they want, instead of giving them what they need.

I encourage you toward the book *When Helping Hurts* by Fikkert and Corbett. It is available in the library.

TESTIMONY TIME—ADELAIDE SMITH



Although we were not raised in a Christian home, my sisters and I were blessed with parents who exemplified Christian virtues. Thankfully, too, my father's parents were dedicated Presbyterians who taught us the 23rd Psalm, warned us about hell, and encouraged us to attend Sunday school, which we did occasionally.

At an early age, God gave me a great desire to find the true religion. Growing up, I visited different churches and was attracted for a while to the Quakers and then the Unitarians. In 4th grade I told a close friend, "If you ever find God, let me know." But later when she relayed His wonderful work in her life, I could not believe that happiness and purpose made the Bible true. After college, not wanting to live my life an agnostic, I defined God as somehow part of nature but later deemed Him "infinite consciousness" because I couldn't pray to an unconscious God!

Gradually, my thoroughly humanist worldview cracked as various observations impacted me. If the universe is running down, it must have had a beginning, but how could something come from nothing without a Creator? I noted, too, that life is at best a series of satisfactions that don't last; it is meaningless, and there is always something to fear. Also, although I had been shocked to learn that Christians believed the whole Bible, after listening to a boring genealogy, I thought, "This must be true. No one would go to the trouble of making up so many names!" Further, considering the volumes written by brilliant Christians over centuries, there was probably an apology for every perplexity. Perhaps philosophers and evolutionists, not theologians, had wasted their lives.

Then when I was 33, thanks to Pastor Ed Urban, I realized that the first and worst sin was choosing to be as god, deciding right and wrong, true and false. God also gave me a question that was really an answer for me: What are the alternatives? I applied this to many doubts like God's sovereignty and man's responsibility. Mainly, it hit me how ludicrous it was for me to assign qualities to God and plan the universe or question the plan!

Finally, there came a day I could not function until the matter was settled. But what criterion should I use? I admitted that Christians knew and loved their God and would die for Him, but I would never die for "infinite consciousness." Was he worth living for? As I read through the Bible, I prayed fervently to believe it and be changed. And God answered my deep longing for Him with joy that was almost too wonderful to experience. What a blessing it was to be free from fear and from the terrible burden of figuring out what to believe and what to teach my children. How wonderful it was to have purpose and instructions for life, to have hope for all the "faults" that plagued me.

Over the years, I have been so thankful for every insight that has humbled me and exalted God. It is such a blessing to be made freshly aware of His reality, sovereignty, power, goodness, and love, and of my great need for Him and His merciful sacrifice that satisfied His fearful justice. How grateful I am to be newly motivated for selfless, loving service. It is a special joy, too, each time God reveals another application of His infallible, all sufficient Word to life, to culture, to family, church, and state. How I pray the Lord will raise up a generation whose mountain-moving, stronghold-destroying faith in the King of Kings turns the world upside down again.





NEW IN THE LIBRARY



The library has recently added some new books. We hope you will be interested enough to check them out and read them. The list and a brief description from the sellers appear below.



Systematic Theology, Second edition by Wayne Grudem - If you are someone who thinks theology is hard to understand or boring, then this second edition of Systematic Theology by Wayne Grudem will likely change your mind. Each chapter of this most popular systematic text of the last 25 years has been thoroughly revised, updated, and expanded, while retaining its lucid explanations, practical applications, and emphasis on the scriptural basis of doctrine. It also includes recent controversies on topics like Trinitarian doctrine, the role of women, seeker-sensitive churches, free grace, creation and evolution, perspectives on Paul, and more.

Letter to the American Church by Eric Metaxis - The author of a bestselling biography of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Eric Metaxas reveals the haunting similarities between today's American Church and the German Church of the 1930s. Echoing the German martyr's prophetic call, he exhorts his fellow Christians to repent of their silence in the face of evil. An attenuated and unbiblical "faith" based on what Bonhoeffer called "cheap grace" has sapped the spiritual vitality of millions of Americans. Paying lip service to an insipid "evangelism," they shrink from combating the evils of our time. Metaxas refutes the pernicious lie that fighting evil politicizes Christianity. As Bonhoeffer and other heroes of the faith insisted, the Church has an irreplaceable role in the culture of a nation. It is our duty to fight the powers of darkness, especially on behalf of the weak and vulnerable. Silence is not an option. God calls us to defend the unborn, to confront the lies of cultural Marxism,



and to battle the globalist tyranny that crushes human freedom. Confident that this is His fight, the Church must overcome fear and enter the fray, armed with the spiritual weapons of prayer, self-sacrifice, and love.

No Reason To Hide: Standing for Christ in a Collapsing Culture by Erwin Lutzer - The question he raises is, "Will you be complicit, complacent, or courageous?" See Frode's review elsewhere in this newsletter.

Tactics: A Game Plan for Discussing Your Christian Convictions by Gregory Koukl - In a world increasingly indifferent to Christian truth, followers of Christ need to be equipped to communicate with those who do not speak their language or accept their source of authority. In Tactics, 10th Anniversary Edition, Gregory Koukl demonstrates how to artfully regain control of conversations, keeping them moving forward in constructive ways through thoughtful diplomacy. You'll learn how to stop challengers in their tracks and how to turn the tables on questions or provocative statements. Most important, you'll learn how to get people thinking about Jesus. 

We were allowed to have a fire, but it was so dry we had a baby fire and cooked marshmallows.










FROM THE LIBRARY



No Reason to Hide **By Erwin W. Lutzer**

This is an older book written about a much earlier time. The book was originally *No Reason to Hide: Standing for Christ in a Collapsing Culture*

This is an important book for Christians to read. The subtitle, "standing for Christ in a collapsing culture," reveals the general content of the book. Lutzer writes clearly, so the text is quite readable. The content at times is, and probably should be, disturbing. The book has a brief forward, eleven chapters and an epilogue. The chapters follow a general format where a problem or issue is identified and discussed; that is the bulk of the chapter. At the end of each chapter, the author points to a hero or heroes, often from the Bible, and then gives an action

step to take. These latter two portions usually take a couple of pages together.

The chapters cover individual topics, but they are all linked together in the larger cultural drift. He explores the Christian left, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion movement, racism and collective guilt, the problem of self replacing God, the great reset, and so on. Two chapters that particularly interested me because of my teaching background, were the ones on education and language.

Regarding education, he makes a good case against the government schools, but he also takes on higher education which has in large part capitulated to politically correct speech and the cancel culture movement. He warns that even private and Christian schools can and are being corrupted, and he looks at recent history and shows how Hitler, Stalin, and Mao used Marx's ideas to form the youth of their nations. It's all about making people believe the same things, that is, what the government wants them to believe.

The language chapter references George Orwell's *Nineteen Eighty-Four* and Newspeak: War is Peace, Freedom is Slavery, Ignorance is Strength. It is about changing the meanings of words so that some communication becomes meaningless. Tolerance, for instance, no longer means the ability for all voices to be heard; the only views tolerated by the hard core progressives are their own; the rest are to be silenced. Even the word progressive has shifted its meaning. One of his subchapter headings is "The Same Words; A Different Dictionary." He has an excellent section on six ways language is manipulated by propagandists. He follows up on how we can counter propaganda. It's a good chapter.

There are some memorable quotes in this book. "Understand that information is not wisdom." (P 159) In the 1980's he and others visited China and met with Bishop Ding who told them he knew what they believed and, "you will find Christians who believe like you do because persecution wiped out theological liberalism in China (P 264) After all who is willing to die for a watered down Jesus or belief system? And finally, "The radical left wants your children. And they want them young." (P 214)

This book is a warning, a description of what is going on culturally, but it is not designed as a manual for success. It is a bit short on practical things although it gives good general advice. Lutzer thinks we will not escape what is coming, that there will be dire persecution for Christians ahead. While he isn't predicting the end times are coming soon, he points out lots of signs in favor of that outlook. The general feeling I got was that there are things we need to do, but it will be a losing battle collectively even if we are individually successful in our resistance, which will likely result in personal suffering and possibly death. I do recommend the book.

FAITH 2023 BIBLE ACADEMY

The session has decided to do a chronological approach to the Bible reading this year.

You will be given a chart each week. It will be on the church website, www.faithgp.org, sent via email, and in print on the table in the foyer each Sunday. The reading will begin in the Old Testament this year at the very beginning, Genesis 1. Using this plan we will not get through the Bible this year. The reading will consist of about a chapter per day except for Sundays. Sunday will be a review day; you will not have to read anything but your chart. The session is asking you not only to read the Bible but also to react to it. The goal is to get you to think a little about what you are reading. You will find space to write on the chart; we are asking you to do two things; see below.

You will be asked to generate a short thought about the reading, probably 15 words or less will fit in the space given. It can be a summary, a reflection, whatever you decide. For instance, let's say you were asked to read Leviticus 25. It is relatively long being 55 verses, and it covers a lot of material: the Sabbath year, the year of the jubilee, and the redemption of property and of the poor and enslaved in that year. You could make a summary statement about content. It covered the Sabbath year and the year of Jubilee. You could reflect on the chapter's content. God gave them specific rules for redeeming property and people. The 50 year redemption is a shadow of Christ's ultimate redemption. I don't think the jubilee system would work today. You might even ask a question? How would this affect investing in property in year 48? The point is to get you to think a bit about what you have read.

The second thing you are asked to do is copy a verse you like. You are not asked why you liked it. Just pick a verse you happen to like for whatever reason and copy it down with the reference, V14 for instance. Sundays are review days. Again, you are asked to write two things. First, look at your chart and make some sort of statement about the reading for the week. Second, pick one of the six verses you had previously copied down. Write this verse in the review section and think about and maybe even jot a note as to why you picked it. At the forth Sunday evening service of the month, we will talk about your review items, 1st week, 2nd week and so forth. It would be helpful for you to bring your sheets with you to that service. This is an experiment. We think it will take about 15 minutes or so per day to read and fill in the chart. After a time, maybe a couple of months, we will take a bit of time for evaluation of the process. Our desire is to get you involved with your Bible on a daily basis.
