
In the upcoming weeks we will be working together to make the worship space a place of prayer and quiet meditation prior to the worship service. Worship is not something that just happens because we are in the right place at the right time. There is real preparation that needs to take place. In Psalm 103 the psalmist calls on his own soul to praise the Lord. 1 Corinthians 11:28 calls us to examine ourselves before participating in the Lord's Supper. This is best understood to be a meditative process mediating on our apprehension of the gospel. These things and more can be part of

the quiet process that comes before the worship service. Some people do this work on Saturday night, some do it on Sunday morning at home, and some long for more peace at church right before the worship service for this process. It is with a recognition of this desire for a very good thing that we will be working together to make the worship space a place of peace in the 10 minutes prior to the service.

LOOKING TO FIND SNOW?



We are blessed to live in a location where snow is easily accessible. Below are a few snow parks:

When you travel in winter conditions, you must carry chains or traction tires in or on your vehicle, and must use them, when required by the signs posted. Under some conditions, four-wheel and all-wheel drive vehicles may be exempt from the requirements to use chains. You must have a valid Sno-park permit displayed near the lower left corner of the windshield of your vehicle if you park in a designated winter recreation parking area between November 1 and April 30.




What we celebrate at Christmas is not so much the birth of a baby, as important as that is, but what's so significant about the birth of that particular baby is that in this birth we have the incarnation of God Himself. An incarnation means a coming in the flesh. We know how John begins His gospel, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." So in that very complicated introductory statement, he distinguishes between the Word and God, and then in the next breath identifies the two, "The Word was with God, and the Word was God." AUGUSTUS TOPLADY

Augustus Montague Toplady

He was born on 11/4/1740 in Farnham, England.

His dad was a British officer who died in a war. His mother was known for her piety, but others thought she spoiled him. None of his relatives liked him.

On his 11th birthday he wrote, "I am now arrived at age of eleven years; I praise God I can remember no dreadful crime, so to the Lord be the glory."

At 12 he would preach to anyone who would listen. At 14 he began writing hymns. At 16 he was soundly converted listening to a sermon in a barn. At 22 he was ordained an Anglican priest.

He was a staunch Calvinist and didn't like John Wesley's Arminian theology. He said of Wesley, "I believe him to be the most rancorous hater of the gospel system that ever appeared on this island."

In 1776 Toplady wrote an article about God's forgiveness, intending it as a slap against Wesley. He ended the article with an original poem. It appears below, but slight changes have been made over time, notably the last line of the first stanza. Toplady died at 38 years old.

"Rock of Ages, cleft for me, Let me hide myself in Thee! Let the Water and the Blood, From thy riven Side which flow'd, Be of Sin the double Cure, Save me from wrath and make me pure.

"Not the labors of my hands
Can fulfill thy Law's demands:
Could my zeal no respite know,
Could my tears forever flow,
All for Sin could not atone:
Thou must save, and Thou alone!

"Nothing in my hand I bring; Simply to thy Cross I cling; Naked, come to Thee for Dress; Helpless, look to Thee for grace; Foul, I to the fountain fly: Wash me, Saviour, or I die!

"Whist I draw this fleeting breath,
When my eye-strings break in death,
When I soar to tracts unknown,
See Thee on Thy judgment throne:
Rock of Ages, cleft for me,
Let me hide myself in Thee."



FROM THE LIBRARY



Street Smarts **By George Koukl**



November 2023 Frode rated it 4 stars Goodreads review by Frode Jensen This book will be in the church library soon

The author breaks this book into two parts. The first part is about a quarter of the book, and he entitles it "Street Map." Here he explains what it is like out on the street today. In short, it's not like the 70's when he became a Christian during the Jesus movement. He has a very good explanation of objective and subjective truth, probably the best I've read. Eve in the garden sees the fruit and it looks good to her. That's subjective because it comes from inside her. God had told them not to eat of that tree; that's objective truth; it comes from outside. Relativism is the culture of the street and has as its starting point that there is no fixed truth; everything is relative. You have

your truth, and I have my truth; that's relativism, and that's what Christians will face on the street.

He also makes the case for asking questions, which is pretty much stated in the subtitle, "Using Questions to Answer Christianity's Toughest Challenges." He explains the advantages to this approach. The questioner is generally in control of the conversation instead of being on the defensive. It gives the questioner time to think. The answers from the challenger help the Christian to better understand that person's position and therefore be able to better find the holes in the argument. The questions have an escalation to them from general to more specific. He likens his questions to the old TV show about a cop called Columbo, and he ranks his questions as Columbo #1, #2, and #3. Questions also don't come across as confrontational, which helps to keep the dialogue more peaceful and less threatening. Instead of trying to convince someone of your position, you are attempting to understand theirs.


The latter portion of the book is entitled, "Navigating the Street." In this section Mr. Koukl deals with a variety of questions about evil, God, science, abortion, gender, the Bible, and others. Each chapter is a mixture of his commentary on the issue and some of what to expect along with some sample dialogues. Some of the dialogues get pretty philosophical, but others are more straightforward. He makes the point that he is not out to convert those he speaks with. He is a gardener; others will hopefully harvest. He sees his job as putting a metaphorical rock in the shoe of the challenger, something that causes him to think about his position and perhaps re-evaluate his position.

This latter section is the meat of the book. He mentions that the dialogues he gives are examples. They are guides and samples of how conversations might go. They are not to be memorized since rarely will the conversations proceed along the lines he gives without some deviation. However, the first questions are almost always more general in that they ask for definitions or reasons. "What do you mean by X?" "Where did you get that idea?" "Explain that to me; I'm unclear about what you just said."

I liked this book. It is readable and helpful. His presentation with commentary and dialogue keeps things flowing. It is a practical guide for modern Christians who are randomly confronted by those who accuse them of various Christian beliefs or attitudes.

FAITH 2024 BIBLE ACADEMY

The session has decided to do a chronological approach to the Bible reading this year.

You will be given a chart each week. It will be on the church website, www.faithgp.org, sent via email, and in print on the table in the foyer each Sunday. The reading did begin in the Old Testament but we will be pausing and reading in the New Testament. The reading will consist of about a chapter per day except for Sundays. Sunday will be a review day; you will not have to read anything but a good review day. The session is asking you not only to read the Bible but also to react to it. The goal is to get you to think a little about what you are reading. You will find space to write on the chart; we are asking you to do two things; see below.

You will be asked to generate a short thought about the reading, probably 15 words or less will fit in the space given. It can be a summary, a reflection, whatever you decide. For instance, let's say you were asked to read Leviticus 25. It is relatively long being 55 verses, and it covers a lot of material: the Sabbath year, the year of the jubilee, and the redemption of property and of the poor and enslaved in that year. You could make a summary statement about content. It covered the Sabbath year and the year of Jubilee. You could reflect on the chapter's content. God gave them specific rules for redeeming property and people. The 50 year redemption is a shadow of Christ's ultimate redemption. I don't think the jubilee system would work today. You might even ask a question? How would this affect investing in property in year 48? The point is to get you to think a bit about what you have read.

The second thing you are asked to do is copy a verse you like. You are not asked why you liked it. Just pick a verse you happen to like for whatever reason and copy it down with the reference, V14 for instance. Sundays are review days. Again, you are asked to write two things. First, look at your chart and make some sort of statement about the reading for the week. Second, pick one of the six verses you had previously copied down. Write this verse in the review section and think about and maybe even jot a note as to why you picked it. At the forth Sunday evening service of the month, we will talk about your review items, 1st week, 2nd week and so forth. It would be helpful for you to bring your sheets with you to that service. This is an experiment. We think it will take about 15 minutes or so per day to read and fill in the chart. After a time, maybe a couple of months, we will take a bit of time for evaluation of the process. Our desire is to get you involved with your Bible on a daily basis. If you have some other reading plan already in place with which you are comfortable and believe is profitable for you, that's fine; you can continue to follow that in lieu of what we are proposing. We will be continuing through 2024 in finishing the Bible reading, but will switch over to the New Testament.
